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CHAIRMAN'S REPORT – YEAR 2023 TO 2024



Welcome to our Annual Report sharing our achievements across the whole 40th Greenwich Scout Group for the last 12 months. We are a large Scout Group with six sections, 2 Beaver colonies, 2 Cub Packs and 2 Scout Troops and this year, we have just passed our 95th Birthday, an incredible achievement.

The Trustee Board is a team of volunteers who work together, as charity trustees, to make sure Scouts is run safely and legally. At the heart of their role is a focus on strategy, performance and assurance.

Our Trustee Board exists to support our Group Lead Volunteer for 40th Greenwich Scouts, Conway Tearle, in meeting the responsibilities of their appointment. Its members act collectively as charity trustees of 40th Greenwich Group Scout Council and in the best interests of our members.

Scouting for all of our six section across Beavers, Cubs and Scouts continue to enjoy a wide range of activities and opportunities including camping and night's away, the water sports for cubs at Danson Park, a days outing to the RAF Museum for the Beavers. The Scouts visited Brownsea Island, the site of a boys' camping event, organised by Lieutenant-General Baden-Powell, where this event is regarded as the origin of the worldwide Scout movement.

These are in addition to formal events including the Scouts Award Evening in December and the St George's Day Service in April. All six Sections continue to thrive thanks to the continued dedication and support of our Leaders who create and drive a broad and varied curriculum.

Last year we reached out to Parents and Guardians through your leaders to provide support and we have had tremendous response. This has enabled us to support many activities including cycling, camping, cooking and other sporting activities. Our 40th Greenwich Maintenance Days, under the direction of Trustee member Nick, with additional support from other Leaders including Chris, Harriet and Geraint has made great progress at the ExNet at Farejon Road. This is our commitment to support and protect Royal Greenwich District assets for the benefit of current and future Scout generations across the Borough.

I would like to take the opportunity to thank the continued parents' contribution, as it makes a material difference in the way 40th Greenwich Scouts can run and operate. During 2024 to 2025, we will continue to ask for your support and it has never been easier to join up.

We have one critical-post to review and post expenses for the Group. The size of the Group means that we have a good flow of transactions and we need to pay our suppliers as quickly as we can to reserve activities. This is a volunteer group role and not a Trustee role.

Dean Keigan is another former Scout who has a son in the St James' Troop. He supports both Troops mainly at camps and on hikes.

Sam Chatterley was a Beaver, Cub and Scout with the Group and gained the Chief Scout's Gold Award in 2011. He was an Explorer Scout Leader in Falmouth and was a member of the International Service Team at the World Jamboree in Japan, 2015. He returned to us in November 2022.

Dylan Tonge. – Was a St Michaels Scout gaining Gold in 2019, As well as being a Young Leader with Cubs and Scouts. he also works with the Scouts. He transmogrified into an adult leader in October 2023.

Daniel Sutton is another former St Michaels scout who returned to us. Gold Award in 2010. He led the entertainer Badge for us this year. Unfortunately a new job this year means he works Friday evenings.

Beavers

Brenda Openshaw was asked to become a Beaver Leader in 1984 when her son, Graham was one of the first Beavers in Royal Eltham District. She started her Scouting as an Assistant Beaver Leader in May 1984 with the 5th Royal Eltham Beaver Colony based in what we now call The Hub in Briset Road. She had no previous Scouting experience other than accompanying the Beavers as a parent helper on various outings. Brenda stayed with the 5th until September 1989 when pressure of work meant she was unable to fulfil her commitment to the Beavers and had a break in service until October 1990 where she was approached by the then Group Scout Leader of 40th Greenwich, Tom Seal to run Beavers at 40th Greenwich and has continued to do so until the present day.

At first 40th Greenwich was based at Sunfields Church at Blackheath Standard and then in 2000 when Sunfields Church was no longer available to us, she joined with 7th-11th Greenwich based at St Michael's Church. A couple of years after Brenda joined 40th Greenwich she became the District Beaver Scout Leader for Greenwich, a post she held until the District became part of Royal Greenwich. During this time Brenda was awarded the Chief Scout's Commendation for Good Service in 1996 and the Medal of Merit in 2004.

Nicola Scott - Joined 40th Greenwich this year as a Leader.

Samantha Gregory - was a Rainbow, Brownie, Guide, Senior Section and an Explorer in GESS. She is currently a leader at Rainbows and Brownies as well as a leader at G40. She has been providing support to Brenda since 2012 for over 8 years.

FINANCIAL SUMMARY

The following three pages set out the Statements of Financial Activities and Balance Sheet for 40th Greenwich Scouts Group for the year ended 31 March 2024, with the accounts for the year ended 31 March 2023 shown for comparison. This year's accounts have not yet been reviewed by an Independent Examiner, as the previous one is not available. John Howard has kindly agreed to review accounts post the AGM.

I have been Treasurer for G40 for two years now and due to changes by Scout headquarters this role will now be split. It would be good for G40 to get some more volunteers to help with the approval of expenses for the Group. Please contact me if you are able to help.

Overall, almost all income comes in via go cardless with the exception of the Charity Tax Reclaim (not claimed in this period) and a few other transactions. All expenses (149 transactions last year) out of the bank account require two approvals. The leaders and young leaders generally use the Online Scout Manager to collate their bills and expenses. So overall we luckily have a lot of dedicated leaders putting on some great activities and using a finance system that is highly controlled.

At a high level we can see that Income and Expenses were roughly in-line last year. We generated a deficit of £3,099 but when the gift aid claims are reprocessed this will bring in approximately an additional £4,500. We had £15,773 in the bank at year end. If we were to make a surplus every year then our balance sheet (savings) would continue to increase which would also not be desirable. In the prior years we made a deficit of £1,760 and surpluses of £8,015 and £7,677 in the years prior to this. Remembering that budgeting during the COVID period was understandably more complicated. Overall, the leaders are experienced in budgeting for events and therefore there are not significant losses or surpluses on events.

Last year a number of changes were made to the accounts including changing from cash accounting to accrual account and constructing the balance sheet to include the scouts assets. This year there are a few transactions that I will flag to you.

The minibus was unfortunately stolen and a replacement was purchased. The insurance proceeds we received of £8,350 were £663 higher than the book value in the accounts for the minibus so we show a gain in the statement of financial activity in relation to this transaction. The new minibus that has been purchased cost slightly less than the prior one at £6,800. We applied straight line depreciation over 8 years with a residual value estimate of £1k. For simplicity I have assumed a full years' depreciation for this partial year of ownership.

Additionally, I would like to explain that G40 group does not own storage facilities and therefore in recent years has used the garages at the District's camp site at Downe to store its tents and other assets. The roof there developed several leaks that put the Group's assets at risk. In order to protect our assets we agreed to organise and fund the replacement of the roof which was done in lieu of rent to the District. One third of the £5,280 total cost of the roof was then reimbursed to us by the District. We have been seeking a further contribution from a Guide Group who have also used part of those storage facilities for some time and we will continue to try to recover this, however the prudent action is at this point to recognise these amounts may not be recovered and therefore we have written the £1,760 amount off.

The equipment has always been insured as is one of the responsibilities of the Leadership. In the notes to the accounts you can see the insurance value of these assets £31,690 which is the cost if all the assets were stolen or destroyed and we had to replace them all. In contrast the accounts show the market value. The Executive all judge the resale value of the equipment to be a lot lower. We have assumed the market value is only 10%, so £3,169.

Overall, the Executive believes G40 provides significant value for money in terms of the camps and activities that run throughout the year and seeks to break even both by individual event and across the year. Planning for a large body of scouts where attendance can be uncertain is however complex, so both surpluses and deficits arise.



40th Greenwich are committed to making Scouting accessible to all. If you are having difficulty paying for any activities or camps please do talk confidently to your section leader or myself.

¹⁾ Depreciation method for the minibus is straight line over 8 years. 8 years represents the estimated useful life of the minibus assuming sales proceeds of £1,000 in 8 years. The replacement minibus cost £6,800, annual depreciation charge is therefore £725. A full year has been charged as a conservative approach and for simplicity.

²⁾ Other assets are shown in the balance sheet at the lower of market value or replacement cost. The Executives/Trustees estimate that market value is considerably lower than replacement costs and are valuing these assets at 10% of replacement cost. Replacement cost is £31,690 and therefore we are valuing the equipment at £3,169.



GROUP LEAD VOLUNTEER REPORT

I will report on the events that were for everyone in our group and some Leaders' news.

Our annual Family camp continues to be a popular event, especially for the younger members and their families. It is the one event that is truly for anyone in G40. Overall, in 2023 there were 56 campers who enjoyed a hike on the Saturday afternoon followed by a 'hog roast' and campfire. Do put the date in your diary of the next Family Camp – **27th - 29th Sept 2024**. I should tell you that all adults attending will need a scout based DBS clearance to stay overnight. See below on how to get one.

All leaders and the Group Trustee Board continue to ensure that we regularly refresh our training on the key topics as mandated by the Scouts Association such as the First Aid, Safeguarding and Safety training. Some of our new leaders will be undertaking some 20 training modules in the next few years to achieve their Adult Leader Training Award known as the 'Wood Badge'. We appreciate the additional time spent by the leaders to complete the courses or attend the re-fresher courses to enable them to offer the best support and guidance to the Beavers, Cubs and Scouts.

25th World Scout Jamboree - Korea2023 "Draw Your Dream"

The World Scout Jamboree is the largest scouting event organised by the Scout Movement, gathering up to 50,000 people from all over the world. It is above all an educational event to promote peace and understanding.

We are delighted that six 40th Greenwich Scouts were selected to represent South London Scouts at the 25th World Scout Jamboree that was held in Korea in August 2023!

26th World Scout Jamboree - Poland 2027 "Bravely"

The 26th World Scout Jamboree is an upcoming World Scout Jamboree that is scheduled to be held in 2027 in Gdańsk, Pomeranian Voivodeship, Northern Poland from 30th July to 8th August 2027. Participants will be between the ages of 14 and 17 at the time of the start of the camp. Individuals who are older than 18 years of age can take part as volunteer International Service Team members. I expect that there will be an invitation going out early in 2025 to those who can qualify.



DBS clearance

You will need one from the Scout Association if you want to help regularly (more than three times a term) or help with an overnight camp or sleepover. This includes staying overnight at the Family Camp. This is separate from one for your work or other activities. If you have already done one it is valid for five years. If you would like to have one then please contact Conway Tearle – gsl@g40scouts.org.uk who will help with getting one for you.

Gift Aid Scheme

Can I encourage you to sign up for the Gift Aid Scheme, please? This can be done via the Parent Portal in OSM. This effectively increases the annual subscription (£50 x 3) from £150 to £187.50 and helps us to keep the cost of our scouting down..

Lastly, I would like to add my congratulations to all who have earned badges or gained awards in the last twelve months. Thanks are due to so many who have contributed in some way, however small or large it may be, to the success of our group.


Membership


